VOTER VERIFICATION IN YOUR CITY



NORTH DAKOTA DOES NOT HAVE VOTER REGISTRATION

North Dakota is the only state without voter registration, as our voter ID law requires a valid form of ID to vote by mail or in person. Voter ID helps prevent voter fraud by ensuring that eligible voters must verify their identity and meet qualifications prior to casting a ballot in any city. Voter ID has been in place in North Dakota for over two decades.

ENSURING ONLY QUALIFIED ELECTORS VOTE IN YOUR CITY

North Dakotans can **only claim one address as their residency**. Qualified voters can only cast a ballot in their city or county where their address is located. **Strong ID requirements** and the use of **PollPads** in North Dakota verify that:

- Qualified voters are voting in the correct jurisdiction
- Qualified voters are only voting once in an election
- Non-qualified voters are prevented from voting in an election

STRONG ID REQUIREMENTS

Eligible voters **must have a North Dakota issued driver's license or non-driver ID** to vote. A North Dakota Tribal ID is also an accepted ID form. Out-of-state identification is not allowable to vote in North Dakota. Poll workers at each polling location use a PollPad, connected to the Central Voter File, to ensure that only qualified voters are allowed to vote in that precinct.

If someone does not have an updated North Dakota ID and wishes to vote, they must provide supplemental information. Any supplemental information provided is reviewed by election officials to determine qualifications.

POLLPAD VERIFICATION

PollPads, also known as electronic pollbooks, are used only to check in voters at polling locations. They are not used to tabulate ballots.

PollPads read data from a voter's ID and verify the ID information against the Central Voter File. The PollPad verifies a voter's:

- Address
- Age
- Citizenship Status

PollPads also inform election workers whether a voter has participated in the election, whether in-person or by mail. PollPads are connected through a secure, private network to every other PollPad across North Dakota. Once a voter checks in at one polling location, PollPads statewide are updated to indicate the person has voted (in less than two minutes). This prevents voters from voting more than one time per election.
